HAP/NORC Research Project Update

Community-Based Study:

Prioritizing Dignity and Respect in End-of-Life Care for Black Chicagoans



HAP partnered with NORC at the University of Chicago and Arreola Research on a research project to better understand the knowledge attitudes and behaviors of Black communities in Chicago regarding serious illness care. The study is titled, "Community-Based Study: Prioritizing Dignity and Respect in End-of-Life Care for Black Chicagoans." The study is being widely distributed to health care

providers and to the community to encourage conversation and to create change for greater access to end-of-life care.

Information and feedback were gathered from participants through small focus groups and one-on-one interviews. The research team hopes the published results, which highlight participants' stories and experiences around disparities in serious illness, will reduce inequities in hospice, palliative care provision, and will promote education in communities and clinics to raise awareness about the importance of empathy, dignity, and hope for everyone.


<u>Hospice News</u> shares HAP/NORC Dignity and Respect Research Study Findings






On April 11, <u>Hospice News</u> published the findings of the "<u>Community-Based</u> <u>Study: Prioritizing Dignity and Respect in End-of-Life Care for Black Chicagoans,</u>" a joint project between The HAP Foundation, and research collaborator, NORC at the University of Chicago. Jim Parker highlights the racial divides on access to hospice services across the country. Child life specialists can help address a range of unmet psychosocial, emotional, and spiritual needs of families with seriously ill children. These professionals help families navigate difficult conversations and health care decisions through a developmentally ageappropriate approach.

Some goals of the partnership are to support research and education in child life specialist services, and to educate the community on the child life specialist role and its benefits. HAP will help CLHPN develop continuing education programs for child life specialists working end-of-life care while also raising awareness of their work among other specialty clinicians in the field. May 2 is National Life Insurance Day—a great opportunity to review your policy to make sure it still meets your needs. You might also consider donating insurance as a gift to a charitable organization, such as The HAP Foundation, in a couple of ways.
